When you spend time with her it is obvious that she is giving these children more than a life skill. The director and the teachers also reflect a deep level of care for these children. 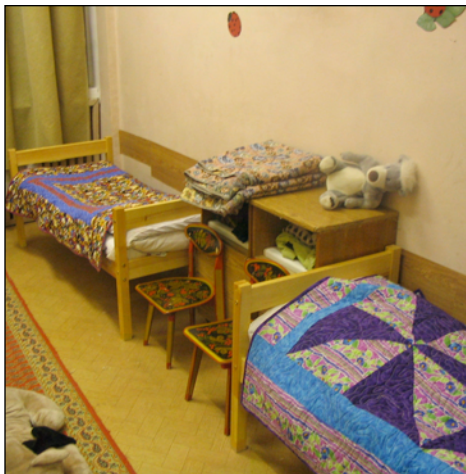

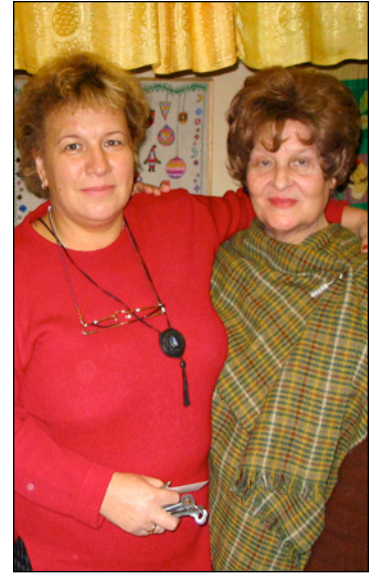
Igor loves to sew and is very talented!
